Uniform Requirements

- BSA Shirt with appropriate markings and patches (Class A)
- BSA or Troop Neckerchief and slide or Bolo Tie for Star rank and above
- BSA Scout belt; Merit Badge sash; and Scout Handbook.
- Other Official BSA items are optional (cap, pants, socks, etc.)
- Scout T-shirt (Class B)
- Note: Troop provides Troop neckerchief; patrol, position, and rank patches; merit badge patches; quality unit and year bar patches.

Finances

- Troop prepares and follows an annual budget.
- Fund Raising: Fall popcorn sale is required. Product profit goes to the Scouts account. One or two other fund raisers may be available.
- Scouts have individual accounts.
- Monthly dues of \$7.00; Annual fee of \$28.00; and annual registration and *Boys Life* of \$20.80.
- New Scouts joining the Troop pay a one-time fee of \$19.00.
- Campouts, summer camp, and other activities are "pay-as-you-go"
